Miss Colla created a wide range of hands on learning opportunities for our students to challenge themselves including engineering, technology, experiments and robotics. These activities encouraged construction,

Each TRIBE rotated through the four activities, collaboratively working in peers and seeing the results from the activities. Students were tasked with:

- * Science experiments
 "Magic Milk" and "Lava Lamp',
- * Technology using 'Inventioneers' to solve problems using a toolbox
- * Using Spheros to avoid obstacles within a maze and
- * Engineering a card tower that would balance a small doll without the scaffold falling.

A lot of fun was had in these sessions with students highly engaged in the tasks and our older students supporting their younger classmates to ensure success.

In STREAM, students have been continued their focus on coding. Students have moved on to a new robot called Edison. They have been able to explore how Edisons move with either barcodes or blocks like the Spheros. Students have enjoyed racing their robots through mazes and moving in different shapes.

P/1 and 2/3

In STREAM, students have continued to develop their creative skills. They have collaborated and designed different locations to create a P-3 map to use with our BlueBots. Students have explored different shapes that can be drawn by the BlueBots, testing various lines to use.

Senior School Snapshot



In **Writing**, students have explored various features of information reports such as structure and organisation. Students also were exposed to research and note taking skills. These were all incorporated when students created their own information reports about a topic of choice. Students had to research their information, keep a reference list, plan their reports, draft and edit their reports and then publish by hand or using technology.

In **Reading**, students explored character motive and civil rights through

this fortnight's chapters of 'Holes'. Students have had rich discussions around civil rights history and motives. Stereotypes were discussed with

reference to building character and making assumptions.

In **Mathematics**, students investigated how percentages, decimals and fractions are all interrelated. Students spent time focusing on understanding each concept individually, before bringing everything together and expressing how the concepts are linked.






In **Integrated Studies**, the students in 5/6M have been continuing to look at their unit on economics. This fortnight has seen students look into the different costs (not just monetary costs) of their choices as consumers, and how our choices as consumers can impact themselves, the people around them, the community and the environment.



The students in 4/5C continued to explore their geography unit. Students researched different cities around the world. Students had to answer questions about the city including

why the city was built in that location. Students also learnt about the cities and states in Australia.
